Ida Jean Bourke (Brewster) attended Morongo from 1938-1942. She was a day girl for 2 years before becoming a boarder after her family moved to 'GlenBrae' in Donald.

Her Blazer pocket was very impressive and included the following awards;

- Red House Colours – Harris House R (running) 1942, S (swimming) 1941, VII Basketball 1941, IX Baseball 1941, IV Tennis 1942
- HC Harris House Captain
- BC Basketball Captain 1942
- HH Head Prefect in Boarding House 1942
- BB IX School Baseball colours 1941 1942
- BB VII School Basketball colours 1941 1942

Morongo 1982 Graduating Class Reunion.

It had been 40 years since we finished Year 12 at Morongo in 1982 and it was time to reconnect and celebrate!

The first challenge was to find all our contact details; not an easy task. The Geelong College had a list of girls who were in Year 10 in 1980 with mostly, old postal addresses. We decided to invite girls who were part of our cohort in Year 11 and 12 and so, we emailed, messaged, and asked parents, friends and anyone we could think of who might be able to help.

We wanted to make contact and reach out to ensure everyone was included and invited. We were a class of 60 and by the time we got to November, we had an email address, a mobile number or postal address for around 40 girls from our Year Group.

Our invitations went to girls in Hong Kong, Sydney, Gold Coast, Perth, Adelaide and Los Angeles, as well as Melbourne, Geelong and many in regional Australia.

The date chosen was 26th November, which was about the time we finished school in 1982 . . . with an early morning celebration on the banks of the Barwon River and then, we rode our bikes back up to Morongo wearing black garbage bags and gold headbands.

Twenty-six girls attended the Reunion – which was fantastic – and we had a few adjustments on the day. Sadly, Di Weaver and Sam Levinson couldn't make it at the last minute, but we were delighted by the arrival of Marguerite English. A photo list is included.


Our big day began at The Geelong College with a guided tour of the Morongo Memorabilia in the Mossgiel Boarding House. Teacher, Amanda Jackman, led the tour and pointed out the pink Morongo Rose in the garden beds, flowering for the occasion. Lunch was at the Sawyers Arms Tavern which was walking distance and a perfect venue. We had the dining room and then, the courtyard to ourselves – which was lucky because we were noisy.

We started the day with a welcome cocktail/mocktail then a feed-me menu of four entrée choices, five main course choices and two dessert choices. Two tables of thirteen meant we could swap spots after each course.

Maz and Meg wrote trivia questions, Angie had found the MORONGO signage from our 30 Year Reunion and Maz also collated photos with Angie, Claire, Annie and Wendy for a rolling slide show. Lindy won the prize for answering the most questions and Liz McLean deserves special mention for knowing the name of the cross on the Morongo School emblem.

The Tavern closed at 11pm and many of us were still there. We are planning to do it all again in five years - so our next Reunion will be in November 2027.

Great Expectations – Anne Hastie’s trip to Spain and Austria

As an artist trained in the western tradition, I have spent many hours looking at images of European art in glossy books, and lately on the internet. It is always very exciting to see the original works; paintings, prints, photographs and sculptures, in real life. But some questions come up for me in anticipation of engaging with ‘the real thing’. How will I experience these pieces with which I already feel so familiar? Where (country, museum, open space) does the art work reside and what is the immediate cultural context? What will the surface of the work be like and how will it be lit? What will the colours look like, especially in older works such as those created in the Middle Ages (altar pieces), compared to those which are (only) 500 years old (Renaissance period)? What about the scale - big - small - or blocked by people standing in front with mobile phones taking photos?

Late last year I had the opportunity to travel to Spain and Austria. I was based in Barcelona for three months in a studio apartment. When not painting, I was out and about looking at art and architecture. So much to see!

I would like to give a few examples of how I responded to the questions I pose above. My first anecdote is about the many altar pieces I saw in southern Spain, in Andalusia. I was quickly

overwhelmed, by the numbers of altar pieces, by their size, beauty and pathos, but most of all by their vivid colours and beautiful surfaces. Pure vibrant reds and blues played off against vast tracts of gold; a lot of gold! Hundreds of trained and very talented artists invested years of their lives producing powerful and moving religious art. Many items were very large. Photos in books have never done these pieces justice - they were far more beautiful in real life.

My second anecdote regards a work by Flemish artist Pieter Bruegel the Elder, called the Tower of Babel (1563). I arrived on an overcast day in the forecourt of the Kunsthistorisches Museum in Vienna, a grand, palatial, pale grey marble building in which the painting is displayed. As I prepared to enter the building I passed behind the ticket office to find a huge vinyl poster of the Bruegel image plastered over the rear of the portable booth.

Excited at the thought of seeing this famous painting that has fascinated me for years, I wandered through this enormous museum containing many extraordinary and some very, very large paintings (metres wide and high) to eventually find Bruegel's Tower of Babel in a corner, surrounded by people taking a closer look - because it is small! Compared to the other works nearby, it seemed diminutive. Never-the-less it is exquisitely beautiful. What I did notice though is that reproductions of the painting did not capture its real colours.


Back in Spain, I have always enjoyed the creative genius and quirkiness of the Catalan architect Antoni Gaudi. Barcelona has so many wonderful examples of houses, palaces and parks designed by Gaudi. Then there is his masterpiece, the Sagrada Familia, which has been under construction since 1882. After over 100 years of construction the basilica is now nearing completion.

On my last visit back in 2010, the interior was crammed with a labyrinth of complex scaffolding through which visitors were allowed quick passage. I traversed mesmerised, with my eyes cast upwards, marvelling at the height of the supports and the geometric detail that was being realised high above. I loved it!

The interior is now complete, beautiful, but such a different experience - formal, neat, planned and clever. There is still work to do, mainly on the exterior. I'm sure the locals would like to see the cranes gone and have the construction sounds cease, but my preference is to keep the building process going and for Gaudi's dream to continue its wonderful journey of emergence.
