A GOLDEN MORONGO LEGACY

THE MARGARET SHANNON CUP - 2025 AWARDED TO EMILY JARRATT

For a girl in Year 12, in recognition of outstanding overall service to the Geelong College community

Under lock and key at The Geelong College sits one of the most precious artefacts linking **Morongo** with Geelong College – a large and gleaming solid gold trophy, rich in history, sentiment and symbolism.

The Margaret Shannon Memorial Cup was originally presented in 1928 to the Morongo Presbyterian Girls' College, Geelong, by Alma and Herbert Shannon in memory of their daughter Margaret Alma Strachan Shannon (1913–1928), a bright, athletic student and Morongo boarder from Albury. She died suddenly at age 15. The cup was purchased using Margaret's own savings and first awarded that same year at the annual Morongo Sports Day to Lawson - Margaret's House - for success in inter-house sports. As *The Lucernian* noted, *'in some measure a gift from herself to the school that had loved her.'* When Morongo closed in 1994, many of its traditions and treasured stories were carefully preserved by the Morongo Old Collegians' Association.



In 2015, MOCA entrusted the cup, among many of its prized possessions, to The Geelong College where it was reintroduced as an annual award recognising a Year 12 girl who demonstrates the spirit of generosity, courage and outstanding overall service to the College community. The prize was originally funded by the Morongo Old Collegians' Association (MOCA).

Nearly a century after its creation, the Margaret Shannon Memorial Cup remains much more than an exquisite piece of goldwork. It represents the strength of community across time – from the many hands that held the cup at Morongo to the young Geelong College women of today who aspire to have their name etched alongside this historic prize. Its value lies not only in the gold locked away for safekeeping, but in the living legacy it inspires: The Cup embodies the legacy of Margaret Shannon and the long tradition of courage, generosity and service among Morongo girls.

This year's recipient of the Margaret Shannon Cup is Emily Jarrett (pictured above), a Year 12 boarder from Ballyroan, in country Victoria. She feels a deep personal connection with Margaret and described the legacy that Morongo has inspired and provided for young women in the Mossgiel Boarding House.

'Being a country girl and a boarder isn't uncommon to Mossgiel. But I love knowing that before there were girls here at College, there were girls at Morongo - whose footsteps paved the way for us. Coming from far away for opportunity and education and carrying on our families' legacies, is something I'm honoured to share with Margaret.'

Emily first heard about the Cup through Mossgiel staff member, Claudia Cheatley (OGC 2016) who was the first Geelong College recipient of the award.

'Every day at breakfast and dinner we sat below the portrait of Charles Shannon, Margaret's grandfather, so it is a story I was aware of. But hearing from Claudia, the story and the meaning of the award, it resonated with me. Mossgiel girls always give their all. The Margaret Shannon Cup award has inspired me to make the most of every opportunity. I hope I have inspired others to try new things and to be brave too.' Honouring Legacy **The 2025 Morongo Award**

When Hannah Brown learned she had been chosen as the 2025 recipient of The Geelong College's Morongo Award, it struck a deeper chord than simple achievement. For Hannah, the honour carries a family thread.

'The Morongo Award means keeping alive my connection to my uncle's mother, Frances Ashburner (née Lawson),' she says. Frances was a formidable Morongo student—dux of Morongo in 1952, senior prefect and editor of The Lucernian. Her legacy is one Hannah holds in high regard, and one she hopes to reflect in her own future.

Looking ahead to 2026, Hannah plans to study science at the University of Melbourne, specialising in health science. It's a natural progression, echoing Frances' own years at the same university where she pursued microbiology.

The Morongo Award itself has a long-standing place in the Geelong College community. Established in 2001, it is presented at the end of each year to a Year 11 student who will continue their studies at Geelong College and who has a family relationship with a Morongo Old Collegian.

Valued at 25% of Year 12 tuition fees, it recognises academic strength and active contribution to school life. Since its inception, the award has highlighted students who embody the best of both achievement and character. A full list of past recipients - announced and documented at the end of year prior and the benefit is applied during the following year.

THE MARGARET SHANNON MEMORIAL CUP FOR ATHLETICS - 1928

The book, Morongo: The First Fifty Years described the award as follows: It's correct name is 'The Margaret Shannon Memorial Cup for Athletics.' Margaret Shannon was a pupil at Morongo. She had some £200-300 in her bank account and after her tragically early death while still at school, her parents bought the cup with her own money and presented it to the school in her memory. All Morongo girls know the gold cup, and it is hoped that this brief account of it will serve to remind them that it is a memorial cup to a past student who was fond of sport.'

'In memory of their daughter Margaret, Mr and Mrs Herbert Shannon, Upper Murray, have presented a massive gold cup for perpetual competition in interhouse sports at the Presbyterian Girls' College, Geelong. The first competition for the cup took place this year, and at the annual speech day the cup was presented to the captain of Lawson House, at which the late Margaret Shannon was a student'

December 1928 - The Australasian newspaper

Margaret's father, Herbert Strachan Shannon (1880-1955) was educated at Geelong College. Her grandfather, Charles Shannon (1841-1922), was the foundation chairman of Geelong College from 1908 to 1921.

Today, this solid-gold cup – valued at more than \$120,000 – is far too precious to display publicly. It is kept securely in the College's archives.

Given its significance, Geelong College is now exploring the possibility of creating a replica that can be displayed in the trophy cabinet in Belerren Sports and Wellbeing Centre, ensuring the story and legacy can be shared safely with future generations. A replica would be another symbol of continuity between Morongo and The Geelong College and the commitment to excellence in the education of girls.

IT ALL STARTED WITH THE LOVE OF BEER

How did I go from the Morongo Class of '83 to the purveyor of spirits, gins and beer? Good question!

It all started with a love of beer.

After graduating with a Bachelor of Applied Science (IT) I moved to Mt Isa (QLD) and embarked on a career in the mining industry. Working in the industry for about 20 years in both WA and Victoria before, by chance, purchasing a vineyard in Victoria's Otway Hinterland. The property was producing high quality cool climate fruit (perfect Sparkling wine climate) and had a very high rainfall (perfect for making beer). I had always had a fascination of some of the different beers and finally had my chance to fill a passion.

While transitioning into the beverage industry I further studied accounting and tax and found myself running and managing the winery and brewery at Barongarook. Over time we expanded to owning several hotels (Queenscliff, Apollo Bay and Gellibrand) to enable a direct to market approach to our beer, cider and wine and more recently spirits and RTD's (Ready To Drink) beverages.



With the beer process being the first step in Whisky production, our portfolio then went into making spirits – Whisky, Gin, Vodka and Cello's. Today we have a cellar door at Otway Estate and at Apollo Bay as well as selling our Queenscliff products at local markets - after selling our Hotel in Queenscliff.

Now predominantly located in Darwin, NT, I manage the businesses financial and information technology side of things. I still play a pivotal role in the business although enjoying the tropical lifestyle that Darwin offers. I still spend extended periods of time in Victoria so you might just see me at one of the many festivals and events we attend with our big black Prickly Moses bus or at our Distillery cellar doors.

If you're in Apollo Bay over summer ... come and visit me at the Great Ocean Road Brewhouse, Apollo Bay Distillery or Otway Estate. It's always so wonderful to catch up and reminisce about our wonderful time at Morongo.

Kathleen Frances Homberg (nee Davis) was born in Geelong and was the youngest daughter of Frank and Kathleen Davis. Kath attended Newtown Primary School and after finishing Grade 5, she attended what was then Morongo Presbyterian Girls' College, matriculating in 1950. She then worked as a Library Assistant at the Gordon Institute of Technology – from 1951 until 1956. Kath formed strong friendships at Morongo and at work and maintained contact with many of her friends throughout her life. They had annual reunions, and many letters and cards were written.

Kath enjoyed regular swims at Eastern Beach. She played tennis and netball at Kardinia Park - and took great delight in gaining free entry at three-quarter time to the football ground. She was an avid Geelong Cats fan. Kath's greatest memories were being taken by her father to the VFL Grand Finals in 1951 and 1952 and witnessing Geelong's success in both.

Kath met Ian Homberg at the Palais Royal, a former dance venue in Geelong. They met in 1952 and were married at Ashby Methodist Church in 1955. Three of their four children were born in Geelong – Craig in 1957, Jillian in 1959 and Mark in 1961. Ian received a work promotion to manage an Insurance Office in Shepparton in 1961, and the family lived there for six years. Ross was born in Shepparton in 1963.

In 1967, following another work promotion for Ian, the family moved to Ballarat and settled in Wendouree. Sadly, Ian passed away in April 2015, four months before what would have been their 60th Wedding Anniversary. Kath and Ian cherished their six grandchildren and a year and a half ago, Kath became a great grandmother.

Life in Ballarat was busy. Kath was a member of many committees, including school committees, Scout and Guide Association committees, and Church committees. She held positions of President, Secretary and Treasurer on many occasions and enjoyed these roles.

Church was a big part of Kath's life. In Ballarat, she attended the Jubilee Methodist Church, the Wendouree Uniting Church and the Skipton St Uniting Church. She played the organ at services for 40 years (as well as playing music at various aged care homes in Ballarat.) She was a Church Elder, a member of the church Evening Group and she joined the church choir.

Kath went back to work in 1973. She was an assistant in the library at Ballarat High School for twenty-six years. After retirement in 1999, her new interests included joining a U3A Music Appreciation class and the U3A Choristers in 2002. Retirement brought more new friendships and experiences. She was a member of the Wendouree Ladies Probus Club for 20 years and enjoyed the social activities, as well as trips to Canberra, Norfolk Island, New Zealand and Tasmania. During this time, she held the Committee positions of Secretary twice and President twice. She kept fit by regularly walking around Lake Wendouree with a group of Probus friends.

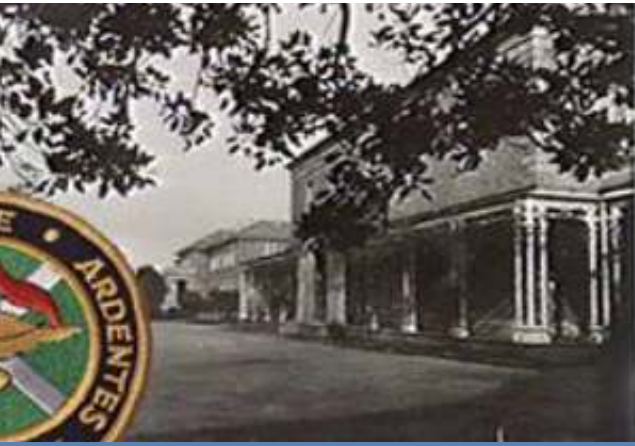


Kath was a great lover of music and derived much pleasure from listening to and playing music. She began piano lessons at the age of seven and continued lessons for ten years. Kath also learnt to play the 'cello and played in the Geelong Symphony and String Orchestras. She also played the 'cello in the Shepparton Symphony Orchestra.

Kath loved gardening. The constant bending and stretching contributed to Kath's fitness - well into her eighties. Each year, she would purchase punnets of pansies and plant them near the front door. She liked to have vases of flowers in the house, particularly roses. She also liked to visit the Ballarat Botanical Gardens during the Begonia Festival.

Ian and Kath liked to travel and completed many holidays in Australia, including four trips across the Nullarbor Desert. Kath also enjoyed cruising holidays. She had a 'sweet tooth' and loved the tiramisu, raspberry crème brulee, chocolate souffle and cappuccino panne cotta.

An agreement dated 31 January 1998, approved by the Uniting Church in Australia, Synod of Victoria, established that these funds would be used to generate income for scholarships supporting female students at The Geelong College.

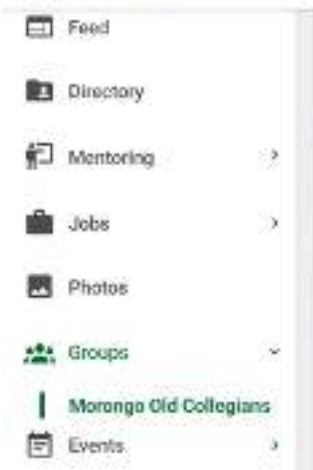

We often laugh about our years sharing a room in Year 10 and 11 in Shaw House, then in various share houses in Melbourne, and travelling together in 1989 and 1990. We were reflecting on our behaviour towards some of the Morongo male teachers including Mr Moritz who taught us Legal Studies in Year 12 in 1982. He was progressive, talented and patient (but I have no idea if he knew we were regularly flicking liquid paper on his backside.) We don't know how it was approved, but he organised for us to visit Pentridge prison to see inmates perform 'One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest.' Then, Salty sent me this:

'... escape from Pentridge Prison in 1982 during a theatre performance of One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest in the A Division Mess Hall. Armed robber Peter Patrick Clune disguised himself in women's clothes and a wig, which a friend had smuggled in for him.

Remarkably, he walked right out of the prison. Clune was recaptured in Sydney seven months later. What the people at Pentridge don't know is that Salty, Maz and Lou were chatting to Clune during the interval - and they suggested he dress in school uniform and leave with all of us. The following night, he did just that!
